My main focus for many years has been photography, though I still have a long way to go in the process of learning this art and my craft. This trip gave me an opportunity to really dive in and build a collection of images I am proud of. This extended experience as a (semi) nomad showed me that there is a way to do what you love and what you are passionate about.

We did this trip on the cheap. I saved a little over 1000 dollars to cover all of my foresee-able expenses. I took a 20 year old Toyota Camry, with over 325,000 miles on it at the time, and outfitted it for extended overland travel. Marina and I lived out of the trunk of the car and the top box ratcheted to the roof rack for 50 days. Some people have mentioned, after me telling them about the experience, "What a once in a lifetime opportunity." Though it may be idealistic of me to say, I truly hope that it is not. In fact, more concretely than hope, I plan on it not being my last extended venture into the outdoors. This project was more than just a vacation, it was real work and at the same time it was one of the most rewarding things I have ever done.
















Grasslands of Northeast Oregon


Nikon D2H 50 mm -1/400 sec- F/9-ISO 200


This image was made early on a mid September morning while I was traveling across the grasslands of northeastern Oregon.


I spent the early part of the morning sneaking past the park host of the camp I stayed at the night before.

In this series of photographs I was working on expressing depth using oblique lines within the frame of the image. I added the sepia tone to the photo in post production as I thought it simplified the image and added to the feeling of late summer.











On our first day in the Tetons we came across a hill covered in a forest of small golden trees. We parked the Camry, grabbed our cameras, and made our way up the hill. It was an ethereal looking scene. The thin trees' branches reached out to each other hiding almost any view of the sky, and the ground was covered by small leafy plants standing about two feet tall. The sun shined over everything we could see, lighting up the leaves, almost all of which were gold.
















Somewhere in Utah Nikon D40 28 mm-1/25 sec - F/5.6 - ISO 200

Photographing some reflections down by the lake this evening :)
















Northeast Oregon Nikon D2H 50 mm -1/800 sec- F/9-ISO 200

This image was made in northeastern Oregon while I was traveling east to Pendleton. I was working on a series of black and white images at this time. I was trying to capture simple structures and lines. I wanted to direct the focus of the image to the architecture of the lines and the meaning of the content, and steer it away from the bright saturated colors my photographic style typically leans towards.

Northeastern Oregon is not short of windmills. Much of the landscape is filled with modern windmill farms collecting green wind energy. This windmill, however, had been standing for some time. This scene has a classic structure to it, and that is perhaps why I was drawn to it in the first place.












Pendelton Roundup, Oregon Nikon D2H 50mm - 1/250 - F/2, 2- ISO 200

I arrived in Pendleton, OR early on a Saturday morning after camping near a small town in eastern Oregon. I had heard of the Pendleton Round-Up before, but I had never attended.

The Round-Up is one of the longest running, and largest remaining Rodeos in the United States. This year will mark its one hundred and second birthday.



Running around and checking out the cool and bizarre little shops and cafes in the various places we made short stops at was a funny little piece of the trip.
































Ice lake at Sunset, Wallowa Mountains Nikon D2H Panorama - 28mm - 1/100 sec -F/9 - ISO 200




Marina Hansen
